

April 9, 2017 Humbled and Exalted

Today's Readings: Matthew 21:1–11; Isaiah 50:4–7; Psalm 22:8–9, 17–18, 19–20, 23–24; Philippians 2:6–11; Matthew 26:14—27:66. In the beautiful canticle from Philippians that comprises today's Second Reading, the dichotomy of humility and exaltation is highlighted. This is the tension of Palm Sunday: we welcome Christ as a king entering the grand city of Jerusalem, and then we proclaim the Passion account where our voices say, Crucify him. Christ Jesus, God and man, is exalted as both a human king and the Messiah, Savior of us all. We clutch our palms tightly and remind ourselves that he is indeed our king.

Hosanna is not just a welcome to the city. Hosanna is our Eucharistic proclamation in which we verbally wave our palms. Palm Sunday is the opportunity to raise our palm branches as we process into church, as we stand in awe and horror through the Passion account, and as we sing once again "Hosanna in the highest."

Throughout the world, whatever branches are in season are gathered and waved today: olive branches, palm branches, pussy willows, flowering bushes. Palm Sunday begins our last few days of Lent. As we approach the Sacred Paschal Triduum, today is our prelude to the glory that is Death-Resurrection. Palm and Passion weave a tension that highlights Christ Jesus, who humbled himself in obedience to the Father, to death on

Monday, April 10 The Meal at Bethany

As you reflect on today's readings, you might want to take time to visualize the meal at the home of Lazarus in Bethany. Martha is serving; Lazarus is at the table; Mary is anointing Jesus' feet with perfume; Judas is protesting Mary's action; and Jesus is quieting Judas. The scene occurs just before Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and his Passion and Death. How are you preparing to spend time with Jesus as Holy Week begins? Will the week center on prayer? *Today's Readings: Isaiah* 42:1–7; *Psalm* 27:1, 2, 3, 13–14; *John* 12:1–11.

Tuesday, April 11 Betrayal and Denial

The setting for today's Gospel takes us to another meal, a meal very unlike the one in Bethany. At this meal, Judas leaves early to betray Jesus and Peter is told that he will deny the Lord. As we move closer to Good Friday, we need to consider our faithfulness. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 49:1–6; Psalm 71:1–2, 3–4a, 5ab–6ab, 14, 17; John 13:21–33, 36–38.*

Wednesday, April 12 Servanthood

"It is the Lord God who helps me." Throughout today's First Reading, Isaiah attributes what he has and does to God. Because of what God has done, Isaiah can sustain the weary with his words and listen "as those who are taught." These are the thoughts of a servant who humbly acknowledges his place before God. Do you recognize what God is doing in your life? *Today's Readings: Isaiah 50:4–9a; Psalm 69:8–10; 21–22, 32, 33–34; Matthew 26:14–25.*

Thursday, April 13 Holy Thursday

The Sacred Paschal Triduum begins this evening. As we observe the washing of feet tonight, we consider how our reception of the Eucharist calls us to service. May we not only serve but allow others to serve us. *Today's Readings: Exodus* 12:1–8, 11–14; Psalm 116:12–13, 15–16bc, 17–18; 1 Corinthians 11:23–26; John 13:1–15.

Friday, April 14 Good Friday of the Lord's Passion

Our focus is on the Cross. We spend time in silence from noon until 3 pm, to unite ourselves to Christ's suffering. At the service in the parish, we hear the Passion of the Lord proclaimed and we adore the cross. Today is not business as usual, for we commemorate Christ's Death. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 52:13—53:12; Psalm 31:2, 6, 12–13, 15–16, 17, 25; Hebrews 4:14–16; 5:7–9; John 18:1–19:42.*

Saturday, April 15 Easter Vigil

At the Easter Vigil, we hear the story of salvation history, the account of how God has remained faithful to us. To prepare for the night, spend time in prayerful reflection with at least one of the readings. Consider how the reading tells of how God keeps the covenant with his people. Sit quietly as you prayerfully respond. *Today's Readings: Genesis* 1:1—2:2; *Psalm* 104:1–2, 5–6, 10, 12, 13–14, 24–35; *Genesis* 22:1–18; *Psalm* 16:5, 8, 9–10, 11; *Exodus* 14:15—15:1; *Psalm: Exodus* 15:1–2, 3–4, 5–6, 17–18; *Isaiah* 54:5–14; *Psalm* 30:2, 4, 5–6, 11–12, 13; *Isaiah* 55:1–11; *Psalm: Isaiah* 12:2–3, 4, 5–6; *Baruch* 3:9–15,32—4:4; *Psalm* 19:8, 9, 10, 11; *Ezekiel* 36:16–17a, 18–28; *Psalm* 42:3, 5; 43:3, 4; *Romans* 6:3–11; *Psalm* 118:1–2, 16–17, 22–23; *Matthew* 28:1–10.

The Lord is My Help

The Scripture this week is full of moments of doubt, feelings of weakness, failure and humility. Behold, your king comes to you, meek... He emptied himself, he humbled himself, obedient to the point of death... And Peter went off, weeping bitterly. All of this, and yet, there is hope as well: The Lord God is my help, therefore I am not disgraced... All who see me scoff at me, they mock me, but with faith I will proclaim you name... I will praise You!

What does it take for us to accept Jesus Christ as our Savior. I mean to truly believe in our heart of hearts that Jesus is there for us, protecting us, caring for us and forgiving us when we falter.

In our quest to grow with God, we will certainly stumble along the way. It is not an easy journey, this life of Stewardship. We may even weep bitterly when we fail, as Peter did. But Peter did not let that moment define him: he found his way and served the Lord.

Will we stand up for our faith like Isaiah, or have the confidence of Peter? The steward, the disciple will, in following this path, meet failure and disappointment—with others and ourselves. We may not always feel we have the strength to stay the course. If we let these moment define us, we cannot succeed. So we need to seek God to help us in our unbelief—to take away our fear, our doubt and our shame.

As we begin Holy Week, and prepare to celebrate Easter, the Resurrection, it is important that we continue to embrace and understand all that Jesus's Passion represent—triumph, joy, death, Resurrection and salvation. This is a time when we should have a full appreciation of



Why do we genuflect in church?

In medieval Europe, one demonstrated respect for a king or noble by going down on one knee.



Good Friday through the Easter vigil.)

Note: While the right knee is reserved for Jesus, we genuflect on the left knee before the pope, cardinals, or bishops.

Why do we get ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday?

To ancient Jews, wearing sackcloth and covering themselves or sitting in ashes showed repentance and humility, and acted as a penance. Thus, the early Church adopted the practice of wearing ashes at the start of Lent to show repentance, too.

But as he places the ashes on our foreheads, the priest says, "Remember you are dust and unto dust you will return," to remind us that our time on earth will pass away but our life in Heaven will last forever.

Why do Catholics give the Sign of Peace during Mass?

The first words Jesus said to his apostles after his Resurrection were, "Peace be with you" (John 20:21). After that their fear disappeared.

By offering each other the Sign of Peace at Mass, we share that peace with the entire Body of Christ.

Jesus also told us to reconcile with one another before approaching the altar of God (Matthew 5:23). Thus, the Sign of Peace is a gesture of Reconciliation with those around us before coming to the altar to receive Holy Communion.

Why do we say "Amen" at the end of some prayers?

In Hebrew, the word "Amen" shares the same root as the word "believe." This root also expresses trustworthiness and faithfulness.

When you read the gospels, you'll see that Jesus sometimes used the word "Amen" twice in a row to emphasize the trustworthiness of his teaching. He wanted his listeners to pay special attention.

So when we say "Amen" at the end of a prayer, we reinforce our faith in what we just said. We also express our confidence that God will hear our prayers.



Why do we light votive prayer candles in church?

A person can only pray for so long. Lighting a candle serves to prolong that prayer beyond our presence in the church. The candle remains behind and symbolizes the desire for the prayer to continue.

So when we light candles in prayer, our intentions remain present even when we are gone. Next time you pass a candle rack, help prolong others' prayers by offering one for the intentions of the people who lit them.

Why do priests wear different colored vestments throughout the year?

The colors of the vestments help bring to mind the sacred mysteries we celebrate throughout the liturgical year. Each color highlights a particular aspect of the season or a specific mystery of the faith.

For example, white and gold symbolize rejoicing and purity of soul. They are worn during Christmas and Easter. Red calls to mind Christ's blood and is worn on Good Friday and to commemorate those saints who were martyred for our faith.

Red also signifies the burning fire of God's love. Thus red vestments are worn on Pentecost.

Why do we call our priests, "Father"?

According to Our Sunday Visitor Catholic Encyclopedia, those in the early Church who gave special witness to the faith were called "Father." In fact, St. Paul said, "For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers. For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the Gospel" (1 Corinthians 4:15-16).

The practice of addressing priests this way was brought to the U.S. in the 19th century by Irish immigrants who called their priests, "Father." Today this title reminds us that we are all united as family under Christ, his Gospel, his Church, and his representatives on earth.

Why do Catholics baptize babies?

"Truly, truly I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God" (John 3:5).

Baptism is the gateway to life in the Spirit, the Church, and the other Sacraments. So it makes sense that it be conveyed as early as possible.

While a child obviously can't consciously choose Baptism, her parents can choose for her. In so doing, they accept for her the priceless gift of becoming a child of God.


2017 SPRING REGISTRATION
