## **Sacrament of Baptism**

Communal Celebrations of Baptism are on the second Sunday of each month at 1:30 PM. Beginning as of Sept 25th,2016 All arrangements for Baptism must be made at the rectory.

## **Sacrament of Marriage**

The Sacrament is celebrated on: Fridays: to be arranged. Saturdays: 10:30 AM, 12:30 and 2:30PM

Sundays: to be arranged. Arrangements must be made by personal appointment with one of the priests. Couples should make an appointment with the priest at least six months to a year in advance of the marriage date. Nuptial Masses as well as ceremonies are available on Friday and Saturday. Ceremonies <u>only</u> are available on Sunday.

#### **Marriage Preparation Program at OLM**

All engaged couples who plan to get married in the Catholic Church are required to complete **Pre Cana Program.** Our Program is offered twice a year. The Fall program meets once a week for 4 weeks: and the Spring program runs for an entire weekend. FOCCUS, a communication study, is administered twice a year and is required for all couples.

Early spring weekend program: Focus administered: Sunday March 4 at 6:45 in the Rectory Basement (after the 5:30 Mass.) classes: Friday, Saturday, Sunday March 9,10 and 11, 2018 – in Our Lady's Chapel Meeting Room.

# 7th Sunday of Easter

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#### **Prayer of Confidence**

Ever-living and ever-loving God, you sent your Son to be with us forever. In our lives we look for your guidance and your protection, and we gather in prayer asking for your blessings to continue. May we find you in one another as we pray together in your name. May we be filled with your Spirit as we open our hearts to be filled with your grace; and may we accept your loving kindness in the assembly of the faithful, even as we are uncertain of where you lead us. We ask this, in confidence, through your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ,

who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.



## May 28, 2017 Christian Living

*Today's Readings: Acts 1:12–14; Psalm 27:1, 4, 7–8; 1 Peter 4:13–16; John 17:1–11a.* Peter tells us in the Second Reading that we must not be ashamed if we suffer in the name of Christ. At Baptism we become Christians, and then carry Christ's name as our identity. In the Gospel, Jesus includes us as among those to whom he revealed God's name and are his own. Together, we share an identity, a calling, a sacramental nature. We Christians must not be ashamed of that identity. In our world today, however, we are often challenged because we are Christian. When that happens, then we turn (return) to Christ's words, teachings, and example to know what we are to do. Jesus' prayer in today's Gospel repeatedly turns all back to the Father in glory. He glorified the Father as he taught us. His care for us was to return us to the Father as faithful people of God.

Even as we live as Christians, we need to examine what it means to live fully our baptismal identity. When we do so, we become more confident in our being identified with Christ. As we near the end of the Easter season, take another look at the profession of faith we proclaim together every Sunday. Discuss the Nicene Creed or the Apostles' Creed in your homes or small discussion groups. How does each section of the Creed profess who you are and what you believe? To go more deeply into this identity, ask how that section of the Creed is practiced in your life, or how you witness its being practiced in the world. As Christians, we together respond: I do believe.

# 7th Week of Easter at Home with the Word

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#### Monday, May 29 The Holy Spirit

In the First Reading, Paul is confronted with the statement that some disciples have never even heard of the Holy Spirit. As odd as that may sound, we often do not understand or teach about the Holy Spirit, whose power and presence were promised to us by Jesus. The unifying power of the Holy Spirit is singular. The next time you participate in the Eucharist, notice the references to the Holy Spirit, who makes all one. *Today's Readings: Acts 19:1–8; Psalm 68:2–3ab, 4–5acd, 6–7ab; John 16:29–33*.

## Tuesday, May 30 The Hour Has Come

Both Paul, in the First Reading, and Jesus, in the Gospel, are beginning to say goodbye. How do we prepare to say goodbye to family and friends? The struggle is one of loss and deep love. Knowing that someone will be enjoying the Kingdom of God is at odds with knowing that we can no longer share with them the Kingdom insights here. *Today's Readings: Acts* 20:17–27; *Psalm* 68:10–11, 20–21; *John* 17:1–11a.

## Wednesday, May 31 Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The beautiful feast of two pregnant cousins visiting one another is a celebration of family support through prayer and particular insight. Elizabeth, much older, and Mary, much younger, find in one another a way to express the holiness of each other's pregnancy, and to accept whatever God has in mind for them and their offspring. We might want to think of how we can be supportive to soon-to-be mothers. *Today's Readings: Zephaniah 3:14–18a; Isaiah 12:2–3, 4bcd, 5–6; Luke 1:39– 56.* 

## Thursday, June 1 Truth and Belief

How do we know what the truth is? Today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles begins with a dispute over St. Paul and the truth that he presented. How do we determine the truth—or truths—of our faith? The first response should be one of prayer, with Jesus' actions as a model for a prayerful life. Not only does Jesus give us an example of always relying on prayer to mark his life, his final prayers are an appeal to unity among believers. To determine the truth, we must be united in our belief and trust in God. *Today's Readings: Acts 22:30; 23:6–11; Psalm 16:1–2a, 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; John 17:20–26.* 

## Friday, June 2


## Sts. Marcellinus and Peter, Martyrs

Marcellinus and Peter, two martyrs of the persecutions of the early fourth century, were so respected that they continue to be mentioned in the Eucharistic Prayer I. Marcellinus was a priest, and Peter an exorcist. Their martyrdom in the year 304 under the Emperor Diocletian prompted a profound reaction, and their burial sites were eventually the foundation for basilicas built in their names, a testament to so many other martyrs of the early Church. *Today's Readings: Acts 25:13b–21; Psalm 103:1–2, 11–12, 19–20ab; John 17:21:15–19.* 

## Saturday, June 3

## St. Charles Lwanga and Companions

Charles Lwanga and twenty-one other Ugandan Christians were martyred between 1885 and 1887 by the brutal dictator Mwanga. Some of the martyrs had been baptized, but many were still catechumens. All were marched to their death, tor-tured along the way, and forced to witness each other's brutal deaths. Their witness is a reminder that, in every age, people struggle to keep the faith alive. *Today's Readings: Acts 28:16–20, 30–31; Psalm 11:4, 5 and 7; John 21:20–25.*

In the Year 2002, I opened my heart to the profound possibility that God was calling me to a much different capacity for service in His Church and for His People. I subsequently entered the priesthood formation program in August 2003 at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception in Huntington. I was ultimately ordained to the priesthood of Jesus Christ through the grace of God on June 14, 2008. My first parish assignment was the Cathedral of Saint Agnes in Rockville Centre. I then had the privilege to serve as a Navy Chaplain for a two-year period at the Naval Submarine Base in Kings Bay, Georgia.

I have been serving primarily as the School Chaplain at Holy Trinity D.H.S. since September 2013, as well as ministry at Our Lady of Victory in Floral Park and Our Lady of Lourdes in Malverne. I'm most grateful for these priestly experience as appointed by Bishop William Murphy, and now being assigned as the Pastor of Our Lady of Mercy by Bishop Barres. I am also looking forward to working with the OLM Grammar School and Religious Education Programs to meet the faith formation and spiritual needs of our children. It is a wonderful honor and privilege for me continue all the good work of Father Steve, and from all the previous pastors and priests assigned to OLM. I look forward to personally greeting you and the community next month in June, please feel free to introduce yourselves to me. I anticipate the day when we meet and continue our mission by working together in our respect ministries to build up the Mystical Body of Christ at Our Lady of Mercy and beyond as a community of faith, hope and love.

Now they know that everything you gave me is from you, because the words you gave me I have given them, and they accepted them and truly understood... and they have believed." —John 17: 6-8

If you really listen to the Scriptures from the Ascension to Pentecost, you get a sense of the trepidation that the apostles and disciples felt. Jesus leaves them, they are anticipating the Holy Spirit, but not fully understanding what that means. Oh, and they have many people angry with them, so they are hiding. Christ is risen; they should by joyous! Instead there is fear about next steps.

We all experience fear and doubt. It can be momentary; the sudden worry when a loved one is late returning home. Fear can be consuming; worries about health, finances or relationships can overwhelm us, paralyze us. Jesus reminds us that

when we face life's challenges, we are not alone. The peace Jesus gives is the peace of salvation. Turn to him in prayer to calm your fears and you will find the peace you seek.

## **Called to Adventure**

When an adult bird knows that it is time for its babies to fly, it starts to push. Now, if the chick doesn't get it, the adult bird starts to peck at the feet of the baby. And it gets to a point where it becomes more painful for the little bird to hold on than to let go. The adult bird knows that there is no danger in making the baby bird do what it was designed to do. Birds have feet and can walk, they have talons and can cling, but walking and clinging are not what they were designed to do. And the adult bird knows that it is no big deal to push the babies to do what they were designed to do—to fly. Flying is what birds do best.

God knows that giving ourselves to God's work and kingdom and to others is what we do best. That is the design of the universe. And some of us look pathetic clinging to the branches of this world—the branches of bank accounts, and of things accumulated—clinging to a nest of selfishness.

We don't think we can take a risk because we have never let go. God is calling each of us every day to do just that—to trust that our "wings" will carry us and just let go. And when we do, we will be amazed at the experience. We will soar—in God's grace.

In addition, if anyone has a folding shopping cart that they no longer need, please donate it to the food pantry for our families who walk to the pantry. Thank you.






St. Joseph Cafasso St. Joseph was born in Castelnuovo d'Asti in Italy to peasant parents. From a young age,

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## Don't let anxiety cloud your world

The peace Christ promised to his followers is not intended to eliminate all anxiety from our lives. When we experience feelings of insecurity, we will feel anxious. However, allowing our anxiety to cloud our judgments can be the greatest obstacle to receiving grace and it is that grace which helps us to cope.

Know the symptoms. Anxiety is like fear but dwells on personal inadequacy and insecurity rather than real and

imminent danger. Common symptoms of anxiety are nervousness, mental unease, tension, or a desire to avoid a particular situation or person. When you can't determine a specific. reasonable cause for these feelings, it may be anxiety.



#### Why does the priest add water to the wine at Mass?
